Throughout my academic career, I have had the opportunity to teach, and design academic programs and coursework in a variety of circumstances around the world. I have taught at several universities in the United States and have also taught in Korea, Philippines, Malaysia, and Indonesia, while designing educational programs in Latin and South America, South Africa, Eastern Europe, and Central Asia. I am comfortable and experienced working with a very diverse student population having worked with students from more than one hundred nations.

- I identify core concepts that are needed to develop an understanding of a course's content and emphasize the development of critical thinking skills, preferring to help students develop the tools needed to analyze and question what they see, read, and hear. I encourage students to try and understand how and why theory works, rather than merely memorizing what someone else has written.
- I prefer to create an active learning environment to motivate students to learn and understand the material being covered, empowering them to take ownership of their education.
- I encourage students to approach problems creatively and develop an understanding of the foundations of analysis. I emphasize that students need to integrate what they learn across subjects to solve real-world problems.
- I have been teaching online courses in economics for more than four years and am currently teaching online courses in managerial economics. I have used and am very comfortable using various learning management software programs including D2L, Canvas, Blackboard, Top Hat, and 2U, and have incorporated Adobe Connect and Zoom into online classes.

I have been recognized as one of the top 125 professors in the United States for incorporating media, technology, and current events into the classroom by the Wall Street Journal and have taught both online and hybrid courses.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

Extensive experience designing curriculum and managing all aspects of training programs. Very organized and experienced working on multiple projects. Experience managing a highly successful English language and university preparation program, for international students.

Developed and managed a joint Masters degree program with the University of Colorado, Boulder in International and Applied Economics. Recruited students and taught in the program as well.

I have designed training programs for universities, commercial banks, businesses, and government agencies around the world. I have developed training programs for education initiatives of various US government agencies such as USAID, the Department of Education, and the State Department. I have also worked on academic education initiatives for the United Nations, the World Bank, the Institute for International Education (IIE), and Harvard Institute for International Development (HIID). A sample of these activities follows.

Africa and the Middle East:

- Arranged a private meeting with former President Clinton and thirty Palestinian Clinton scholars at a conference in Aspen, Colorado to address the scholars' perceived injustice of US government policies toward Palestine and Israel..
- Developed an executive training program on social justice and public policy for the US State Department and USAID principally for the State Department's Nelson Mandela scholarship program.
- Set up and taught in a short-term executive training program on bank management, risk assessment, and export financing for the Egyptian Banking Commission.

Former Soviet Union: Eastern Europe and Central Asia

Designed academic programs and curriculum projects for the Institute for International Education (IIE), USAID, US State Department, the UN, and the World Bank. The executive education programs were for officials from Central Asia and Eastern Europe. I have worked with the US State Department and USAID to change the funding for graduate study for Central Asian scholars studying in the US from Economics to Law and Government Studies as there was a greater need to develop institutional infrastructure in these nations as compared to economic analysis.

- Set up projects addressing government structuring and public sector management to rival political groups in Bosnia-Herzegovina.
- Participated in a State Department forum on energy and the economic reality facing the former Soviet republics after the break-up of the Soviet Union.

- Developed and supervised training programs for multiple groups of Russian scholars, under the Russian Scholarship Program, for Russian students coming to the US to study after the breakup of the Soviet Union.
- Designed and managed multiple training programs on portfolio management and financial sector reform, transportation policy and infrastructure development, as well as public policy and public sector management, addressing development concerns in Central Asia.

Asia

I have been working with nations in Eastern and Southeastern Asia for many years. Most of the projects have concentrated on generating skills and institutional market arrangements that would allow the nations a greater role in the global economy. Recently, I have been discussing the possibility of joint research programs as well as study abroad opportunities for US students in Asia.

- Developed and supervised several executive training programs in the US and Korea for personnel from Hyundai and Samsung electronics.
- Established a training program covering advanced economic theory, mathematical economics, and econometrics for the Malaysian Economics Association, the University of Malaya, and the Central Bank of Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur. I also taught in the program.
- Designed a bank management program for the National Agricultural Banking
 Cooperative in Korea after banking deregulation in Korea allowed a more universal
 banking market. Later, designed a course at the University of Denver on the
 development of banking and debt markets in newly industrialized and developing
 nations.
